

"I am doing my part!"



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




Two-point perspective rendering









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Outdoor Theater by Le Corbusier








Project 1

Site: 20' X 40' lot in a cohousing community

Program: Young working couple

Concept: Well lit and compact house that complements the community. Offset stacked boxes were used to maximize usable space, allowing two balconies, and a cover for parking. The windows on the stair tower face the Community Center to connect the circulation throughout the house to the community.

Site: 18' X 150' lot in Chicago's Gold Coast


Program: Marine Biologist couple with one baby

Concept: Submarine-like, surrounded by marine life. House has an open core to bring lighting from above to the center of the house. Through core, windows used to show brick and foliage that surround the house. Block windows were used to allow lighting and maintain privacy facing the street. Floor to ceiling aquariums in living spaces were used to create a double or triple aquarium layer as you walk through the house. On the third floor coy fish tanks were placed that can be used for mating, even through Winter.
